Phoebe Barkan reports that she is writing her memoirs of Robin and Una. They will be invaluable. She makes a knowing comment: "I think this reading age is either lazy or afraid of Robin's message."

Lawrence Clark Powell has sent us a publication of his address given at the Grolier Club of New York in January '64, entitled <u>The Three L's</u>. Larry, whether on a podium or at his desk, is wonderfully articulate and never fails to slip in a reference to Robinson Jeffers.

We have received encouraging news from the North Carolina University Press about our Robinson Jeffers biography and are in the process of rewriting it along the lines they have suggested. We even agree with them!

FIGURES IN A COAST RANGE DANCE OF DEATH

For R. J.

Thrown up against the mountains and the clouds by your eye's light they sway like shadowy giants wrestling with death and passion on an age's precipices; they quiver with pain become one with wrenching spasms in the headlands and, through their self-imprisoning trance, hear, under the grinding slow scouring-away of the shore by the tides, the impotent surge and suck-back of their fate.

Change cannot reach them in their separateness whose kinship is with eagles and the sun benign inbreeder of their agony.

And, when the granite tower your hands have made lies splintered, they still will press their eyes against the windows of men's minds, phantoms, but firmer than the subsiding hills that jolt into the mutter of the rising sea.
